The OECD periodically publishes a compilation of the products of major studies, initiated by the Insurance and Private Pensions Committee and related policy work, in the *Pensions Outlook* series. The latest version of what has become a biennial series was released at the December Working Party meeting.

The publication contains five chapters:

1. Responding to the challenges posed by population and longevity risk
2. Post crisis pension reforms
3. Saving for retirement and the role of private pension provision in retirement readiness
4. Increasing private pension coverage and automatic enrolment schemes: Evidence from six OECD countries
5. Pension communication: Pension statements and national campaigns
